



Synopsis:

Fifteen years ago, superheroes walked the streets of Metroville performing acts of great heroism and inspiring many to follow their example. But a string of lawsuits by disgruntled people they had helped led to political and public outcry, and the Supers were forced into retirement and government-funded anonymity. Bob Parr used to be Mr. Incredible, one of the greatest and strongest Supers; now, he lives a mundane life as a suburban insurance agent.

Discussion Questions

- Each character in the film had his or her own superpower. Which superpower would you want the most out of those in the film? Is there a different superpower that you would want? Why?
- Superboy says you can be a superhero without powers. Can you think of any superheroes that don't have natural superpowers? How did they become superheroes?
- Even though you probably don't have superpowers, what are some of your talents that you consider to be "superpowers?" What do these superpowers help you do?
- The Incredibles all had superpowers (even Jack Jack). Is there something that makes your family stand out or makes them seem different? What are the types of things that you all like to do together (besides fighting crime, of course).
- What is the most exciting adventure your family has ever gone on together?
- Why do you think Violet had a hard time using her powers at times? What changed for Violet that allowed her to use her powers?



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Activities

- The costume or uniform for a superhero is one of the most important parts of his or her identity. You're Edna! Design superhero outfits for your family.
- The Parr family came together when they worked as superheroes together. Plan an outing for your family. Promote teamwork and give everyone a job to do to prepare for the day.
- Make an Incredibles mask with construction paper and yarn to wear around the house when you're feeling "incredible".
